THE FIRST DECADE

Tuesday 16th September at the Howick Bowling Club Pavilion, organised by the then Lions Club of Pakuranga on the 24th October a resolution was passed;

That a Lions Club be formed in the Howick District.

We acknowledged with gratitude the invaluable assistance of our sponsoring Club and particularly the commitment of members Peter Clark, Basil Silcock Mark Williams and Peter Gibson together with the help received from International representative Keith Mitchell.

1962; President Earl Richardson (later Sir Earl) Our Charter was presented during a great night on

the 12th March at the "Colony" by the "Father" of New Zealand Lions, the first District Governor and later our first International Director, the late Horace Kirk.

In 1962, Lionism in New Zealand was in it's infancy. The 29 original members, some of whom were real characters, fellows with



enthusiasm. who enjoyed their efforts to ensure that the Club was firmly established on a sound basis.

The fledgling Club was kept busy with activities such as: assistance with the "Miss Auckland Contest," Tree planting in the Howick Domain and Eastern Beach cleanups, significant involvement in organising and collecting for the Braille Week and I.H. C. collections. Brian Harris recalls that soon after, Charter funds were raised, and contributed to the Howick Sea Rescue to assist the replacement of the then ten year old rescue boat motor.

To those 29 members we owe a debt of gratitude for the foresight and enthusiasm that contributed greatly to the ongoing success of our Club.

1963; President Bill Williams;

Bill's opening remarks for the commencement of the club's second year were "Let us have the satisfaction of knowing that we have done our work well so that people will say-"whatever they do— the Lions do well".

The first steps were taken with a view to the building of appropriate housing by way of flats for senior citizens of limited means in Howick. A further initiative was a "Mock Court" fund raiser for the projected swimming pool at Pakuranga college.

Issue 1 of the Tatler appeared in March and the name was derived from the original being founded in 1709 by Richard Steele. (according to "Google!")

1964: President Keith Christian

Pakuranga College Swimming Pool:

Notable assistance by way of a Mock Court, (LSD 434.17.0) and Gala functions including the raffle of a Jaguar car (cost in 1964 LSD 2000.0.0.)

This was won by a Jack Lyon who had been the manager of the Olympic Pool in Newmarket and later Swimarama Panmure.

The Club also staged a Paddy's



Market in aid of the College gymnasium.

In October the Clubs sponsored a successful Lions Golf tournament at the "Grange" attended by 70 Lions from 10 Clubs. The proceeds going to the NZ Foundation for the Blind.

196; President Ron Wood Lions Club of Waiheke:

Enthusiasm and hard work saw this Club duly chartered with a memorable journey to Waiheke on the SS Kestrel.

Amongst a schedule of minor activities , the 'Westminster " project continued and Austin Martensen received the Presidents Award for his sterling work on the project.

1966; President Brian Harris (Life Member) The Club hosted the **202A District Convention.** And it was voted one of the "best" ever and the forerunner of subsequent successful hosting in 1980, 1992, and 2002.

If that wasn't enough it was a busy and interesting year with participation in the Annual Braille and IHC Collections, Tree planting in the Howick Domain, five local beaches cleaned, a Gala day at Eastern beach, an outing for children from the Our Lady Star of the Sea together with participation in the "Miss Auckland Contest" There was also a golf project and assistance given to preservation of Shamrock cottage.

1967; President Eric Saunders Westminster Flats.

The planning and construction of eighteen flats in Pakuranga Road. This would be one of the largest activities of the Club (And perhaps by any Club) undertaken.

Thanks to many willing helpers a significant portion of the costs were at "mates rates"!

Our accountant stated that In 1968 dollars the project cost some \$140,000.00.

Whilst it was a 100% involvement project special recognition was made to Bill Williams, Keith Christian, Austin Martensen, and John Sibbes. These four together with other past and then present members contributed many hundreds of hours to the project.

1968: President Norm Leese

Interest in the Westminster Flats continued with all units sold by October and a committee formed to visit the residents and give any support needed.

In those times members were active in street collections for the IHC and the Royal Foundation for the Blind. Also actively supporting community activities, Howick Kindergarten Day, and the Centennial library.

The outing for Seniors together with a large contingent of children from Our Lady Star of the Sea was voted a great success.

A "hands on" year with an on-going lawn mowing project for a senior citizen, a project including the purchase of a "mannekin" for life saving activities and painting the Plunket Rooms.



A significant activity with Howick Jaycees raised some \$1265.75 being an initial contribution to the proposed formation of a Community Youth centre which morphed into the Recreation Centre as we now know it on the main highway from Pakuranga.

The 10th Anniversary of the Club's Charter Presentation was held on the 26th March 1972 at "Romfords" on Tamaki drive.

This was a "Champagne Ball" attended by then District Governor John Mason and a good friend of the Club "Knocker Wells from Hikurangi. The cost of the evening was the princely sum of \$10.00.
